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## Curricular connections are endless for a Stories in Art Virtual School Tour!

Art is truly interdisciplinary. Artists respond to the world around them and touch on a range of subjects such as mathematical concepts to music to social justice issues to literature.

During the booking process, you'll be asked what your students are learning in the classroom, so that museum educators can make connections on the tour. These are just a few examples of how Stories in Art connects to Florida State Standards!

## Elements of a Story

**Grade Level:** K-12

**Florida State Standards:** VA, LA, SS, SC, MA

**Tour Overview:** Students will explore how artists create a story, using shape, line and color to describe settings and characters. They will discuss the components of a story and search for visual clues that reveal narratives, then brainstorm ideas such as, "what might happen next?".

# World History and Cultures

**Grade Level:** K-12

**Florida State Standards:** VA, LA, SS, SC, MA

**Tour Overview:** Students will explore how artists have shared the histories of cultures from different parts of the world. They will examine artworks from different times and discover the materials and techniques artists developed to tell tales that convey meaning through visual form.

# Social Justice

**Grade Level:** 6-12

**Florida State Standards:** VA, LA, SS, SC, MA

**Tour Overview:** Artists from around the world have represented the diverse voices of people who stand up for social issues they believe in. Students will discuss social justice themes such as racism, gender inequality and politics, reflecting on how artworks offer us a lens into important moments in history as well as current events.
