The Norton Museum's second Black History Family Day celebrates the art and cultural histories of Black Floridians, and highlights the Museum's collection of work by artists of African descent

10am-5pm / BlackFlorida Project/ Great Hall

Photographer Johanne Rahaman's photo installation highlights her images of Black rural towns and inner cities throughout the state. Sound design by DJ Boa Kai.

10am-1pm / 'Lift Every Voice' Family Art Activity / Hearst Education Center, Classroom 2 Delve into the James Weldon Johnson's Negro National Anthem, then create a personal version of the poem by highlighting words that resonate, using watercolor and specialty pens.
